Course Description: For students not planning to major in the physical sciences, engineering, mathematics, or computer science. Calculus of algebraic, exponential, and logarithmic functions, with applications. Prereq: satisfactory placement level, or pass M119 or M130. Prerequisite requirements are strictly enforced. Students not meeting these requirements will be dropped from the class. No student who has received credit for M141 or M152 with a grade of C or better may subsequently receive credit for M125. Students who receive a grade of C or better in Math 125 may not subsequently receive credit for M119. **(QR)** 3 credit hours.

Text: Brief Calculus, An Applied Approach, by Larson, 8th Edition, Custom edition, Cengage Learning. This custom package of the book + Enhanced Web Assign access from the bookstore. Special pricing has been arranged by the Math Department. Other options will be given by instructors the first day of class and are given on individual class Blackboard pages.
